

In the 2017/18 Financial Year the school will receive £1320 for each child whose parents have been in receipt of certain benefits at any point during the last six years. The school will also receive £1900 (Pupil Premium Plus) for each looked after child (in care) who:

- Has been looked after for one day or more
- Was adopted from care on or after 30th December 2005
- Left care under a residence order
- Left care under a special guardianship order

In 2015 the Government extended this funding to include pupils in Nursery (Early Years Pupil Premium), the school will receive £300 per eligible child.

The school will also receive Pupil Premium funding, £300 per child, for children from families where a parent is a member of the armed forces.

Attainment

- There are large gaps in attainment between pupil premium and other children in Y1
- A large majority of the pupil premium children in this cohort have additional needs and experience learning difficulties.
- Over the year, gaps in attainment between pupil premium children and others has closed in writing and maths, in SPaG the gap has remained the same, in reading it has widened due to the large increase in attainment of other children.

Progress

- Gap in progress between pupil premium and other children has closed in all areas over the year
- Pupil premium children made greater progress than others in writing and SPaG (spelling, punctuation and grammar)
- Pupil premium children made better than expected progress in all areas except maths

Attainment

- Pupil premium children achieved better than other children in all areas and any gaps are positive gaps.
- There is a mixed picture of gaps across the year in all subjects
- It should be noted that there were only 7 pupil premium children in this cohort and 32 others.

Progress

- Gaps in progress are closing or are growing positive gaps with Pupil premium children progressing at greater rate to others.
- Both pupil premium and other children made better than expected progress over the year.

Barriers to educational achievement

Unfortunately, pupils who are eligible for Pupil Premium funding can face barriers to educational achievement:

- Pupils enter Foundation Stage at a lower than average level in most areas of the curriculum particularly in their speech and language skills.
- Historically, aspirations in Rossington have been low, hopefully with new enterprise and local developments, this will soon change.
